We grow it in our warm growing area, in the same location as our Vandas, and grown similar to our Vandas.

Low temperatures of around 10C over night in Winter, with occasional 8C.

High temperatures of mostly 20C to low 30C during the day in Summer.

Due to an error on the name of the orchid that is the New Competition Plant, all the information I printed on Page 3 of the January Greenhood is incorrect.

The correct Registered name is Aliceara (Alcra.) Snowblind.

The cross is Oncidium Black Diamond x Aliceara Tropic Splendor

Oncidium Black Diamond is (Oncidium nobile x Oncidium Jim Mintsiveris)

Aliceara Tropic Splendor is (Bratonia Cartagena x Aliceara Tahoma Glacier) .

The original intergeneric was called a *Beallara* Snowblind and the Registration was recorded on 12 March 2010.

The Botanists, with all their DNA experience, have changed many thousands of Registrations to take into account their new findings.

If any Members do not have the availability to check whether an Orchid crossing has been registered, I'm happy to do the work for you. Just write out the names that you have on the label and send the details via email or post it to me and I'll try and sort it all out for you. Bev Woodward (Contact detail on page 2)



Let's start with 'Olde England' where at least one salep shop existed in London region is that if large, hard tubers of orthroughout the 19th Century.

Salep has been derived from a wide range of terrestrial orchids throughout Europe.



Ansellia pseudobulbs are a stock-in-trade for the Zulu herbatlist said to cure madness.

There are several ways to make salep but the main one appears to be the collection of tubers just after flowering season. After cleaning, the tubers are dried in the 'delicately flavoured beverage'. sun and then ground to a flour. The flour can be mixed with an assortment of liquids

As it takes about 1000 tubers to make 1 orchids are becoming very rare. In Turkey

treat tradition to the detriment of the indigenous orchid population.

Another early belief emanating from this chids are eaten by males then they are likely to produce male offspring. Conversely, if the smaller shrivelled tubers are eaten by women then female offspring will be ensured.

The tubers of Orchis mascula contain bassorin, starch and other properties sufficient that at one time when England was at the peak of its naval supremacy it was recommended that ground tubers should be carried on all ships as a hedge against famine. It was prescribed that lounce (28 gms) added to 1 ounce of soup concentrate and 2 quarts (2 litres) of boiled water had sufficient nourishment to sustain a seaman for a day. Little wonder that men had to be press ganged into the navy!

Fashionable during the Victorian period was a cup of 'faham' or 'bourbon tea'. It was an infusion from several types of orchids of which the dried leaves of Angraecum fragrans was one. The leaves were imported from the Mascarene islands, Reunion and Mauritius in huge quantities to what has been described as a make
