What should you be doing in your Orchid House/s at the moment?

We are still having some great weather so please check the weather forecast every evening to ensure you are watering at the right time of the day. Watering late evening so the plants can absorb the moisture overnight and the leaves have a chance to dryoff is great if you are to expect a warm to hot next day.

If the forecast is for lots of wind and not so hot, then do your watering in the morning before breakfast. Similarly, if the forecast is for a cold night, then do NOT water in the evening, but do it in the morning if necessary. Better to be dry & cold than wet & hot!

Don't forget to fertilize your orchids as they are growing rapidly in the great weather we experience at this time of the year. Water first then fertilize if the plants are dry. If using a slow release pellet, apply the pellets to the top of the potting mix and then water well to give them a great boost of food. We all need to be fed, remember, just like our Orchids. A message to all Exhibitors who notice that they have a new name or a registration for their plant's names, that are listed as winners above and marked with an #, P L E A S E write out new labels so I don't have to go to all the trouble of checking for Registrations next time you bench your plants. Sincere thank you, from your Editor.

OUR NEW COMPETITION PLANT

On checking what was used in the breeding of the Oncidiun Guilded Tower "Mystic Maze", a very tangled web was slowly emerging.

- 1. There was no registration for Oncidium Guilded Tower on the International Register of Orchid Hybrids, commonly known as Sander's List.
- 2. I then went to Google and was asked if I meant Oncidium Gilded Tower or even Brascidostele Gilded Towet 'Mystic Maze' or even Banfieldara Guilded Tower 'Mystic Maze'. Talk about Chinese Whispers.
- 3. To cut a long story short, this is what I've deduced to be the exact name of these Competition plants.
- 4. Brascidostele Gilded Tower = Brassostele (Bst.) Summit x Brassidium (Brsdm.) Gilded Urchin Registered by J W McCully on 07/07/2005. This hybrid was listed in the 2014-2016, 3 year addendum issued by the RHS in 2017.
- 5. This hybrid has been around for nearly 18 years and during that time, there are too many versions of it's "correct name". I'm re-writing my plant label to that listed in item 4 above. I suggest that you all do the same ASAP.

The Botanists haven't helped the situation when they have reclassified the genera of many plants along the way, but so too have people who have failed to spell the name correctly, either through laziness or just accepting what is written in a catalogue, Newsletter or by word of mouth.

We all must be aware of these changes especially in the Oncidiniae, Zygopetalum and Laeliniae Alliances which have been the 3 most difficult to master. All these species originating from South America.

As a Nurseryman myself, I regularly find that I need to alter the names on my labels, and I do apologise to my customers when I make mistakes. But those mistakes are becoming more regular as the Botanists fiddle with all the DNA changes they make. There should be an easier way to inform our Members when these changes make such massive overall changes to our favourite plants.

HOW I GROW MY PROMEMAEA ORCHIDS

A number of Members have asked me how I grow my *Promemaeas*, so I thought it best I write this article so you all can know my methods. The *Prom. xanthina* and *Prom. ovatiloba* are both in 100mm squat plastic pots, whereas, the rest are in 80mm squat plastic pots. I've never tried to grow them in terracotta pots. I imagine they would be much more difficult to repot as their roots would be damaged too easily when stuck to the sides of the terracotta pots. My potting media is small Ausgro Bark, though Spaghnum Moss is my preferred medium as it stays damp longer than the bark and the root systems absolutely loves it. Cost is the prohibitive factor with the moss, I'm afraid.

These orchids are endemic to Brazil and need medium to lower light; 60-70% shade with little air movement. They require a moist and high humidity atmosphere, so if you have a corner where there is limited air movement, they should to really well. For those who have seen my indoor garden, I have a perfect spot where there is bright light but no direct sunshine hits them. In Summer they may get some very early sunshine but for the rest of the year, they are protected.

They are Summer flowering and thrive in Hobart's temperatures, though must be protected from Winter's frosts and really cold temperatures. If cold, keep them drier.

Promenaea will breed with many other genera including Cymbidium, Ansellia, Zygopetalum, Zygosepalum, Pabstia, Lycaste, Neogardneria, Oncidium, Miltonia, just to name a few. A very versatile Genus and they create absolutely beautiful babies.

Orchid - a nice name

The name orchid originated around 300BC. The scholar Theophrastus used the Greek word orchis, meaning testicle, to describe a plant with underground tubers, which he thought bore a resemblance to testicles. Linnaeus used the name *Orchis* to describe the plant genus that included Theophrastus's wildflower.

This is fine, but there is more to it. Zeus, King of the gods on Mt Olympus, had a long suffering wife called Hera. One day, through a very intriguing process, Zeus and a mortal princess Semele had a child called Dionysius (Bacchus in Roman mythology). Dionysius was therefore a demigod, but eventually became a full god of the sacred drink, wine.

On Mount Olympus, Dionysius eventually met his great grandmother Aphrodite and they had a child Priapus. Hera was disgusted and cursed the child with grotesque features. Priapus and a nymph had a son Orchis who attempted to rape a priestess of Dionysius, but the other priestesses tore him to pieces. Priapus appealed to have his son resurrected, but the Olympians decreed that only his testicles would live on and they grew into an orchid in the genus *Orchis*.
